





The goal of the pilgrimage was to celebrate the life of St. John Paul II and his canonization, discovering what formed him as a man. Walking where Karol Wojtyla walked, seeing the faith that existed and continues to exist in Poland through so much adversity, comparing the atrocities of Auschwitz with the certaintude of God's mercy at the Divine Mercy Sanctuary of St. Faustina allow us as pilgrims to understand that his trust in God was as much a life-giving part of him as food and drink.

YEAR OF FATHERHOOD

WHY FATHERHOOD?

This year at the Marian Festival we announced the parish would dedicate the year to going deeper into fatherhood. But why fatherhood? Throughout the year, looking to St. Joseph as an example, we will explore:

- How being a father is an answer to a divine vocation, a "yes" to a divine promise that fulfill our lives.
- How becoming a father can enrich a man's humanity; growing more in the likeness of God, the Father.
- How being a father makes men sharers in the fatherhood of the heavenly Father, able to participate in His incredible love that opens a future for someone.

WHAT WILL WE DO?

Every quarter, we will show a movie with fatherhood as the focus, explore a novel, work on a study text, and poetry contest. We're also excited to have Adoratio every first Thursday of the month with a reflection on a biblical father and testimonial. We'll also have a monthly topic on fatherhood included in the Sunday homilies, bulletin and website. Below is a tentative schedule.

NOVEMBER 21 CHRIST THE KING

By what authority? Testifying to the goodness of our origins and the proper conditions for our children to grow.

DECEMBER 26 HOLY FAMILY

The Father in our fathers? How God is present in a father's fragility and why some call no one their father.

JANUARY 9 BAPTISM OF THE LORD

What name do I bestow? Introducing the genealogy of saints & heroes and how naming inflicts a healthy wound.

FEBRUARY 27

What life are we generating? Why we should educate until the child becomes a father and how to approach their desires.

MARCH 22

Protecting whom from what? How we face the spirit of the world and when correction is neccessary.

APRIL 24 SUNDAY OF DIVINE MERCY

How many children should we have? How magnanimity can take over our lives and what's at stake in masculinity.

MAY 22

Which inheritance? What supports a child's courage and whether or not it's possible to ruin their life.



WHY ARE MEN IN TODAY'S SOCIETY SO AFRAID OF BECOMING FATHERS?

It may seem that the normal way of living is to get a job and get married. Becoming a father has been merely a side effect of marriage and taken for granted. But becoming a father is actually the fruit of a bigger decision in love and self-sacrifice, one that we must embrace with openness and consideration. We must address our fears of fatherhood like St. Joseph had.

Husbands, you too can listen to the angel's words: Don't fear being a father! Why? Because becoming a father is not only the fruit of a difficult choice, but the answer to a divine vocation. It's a "yes" to a special promise of God. And you are not alone. God will accompany you.

ST. MARY SCHOOL UPDATE

2020-2021 ACHIEVEMENTS

GROWING IN KNOWLEDGE:

- Our students maintained in-place learning full-time despite the ever-changing environment of COVID. In addition, we offered the Saint Isidore distance learning curriculum.
- We had 456 students between Pre-K and the School, making us the largest school in the Archdiocese.
- 100% of our eighth graders graduated and enrolled in High School. Three of our eighth graders received the President Award for Academic Excellence. Another ten received the President Award for Academic Achievement. Five received the Lasallian Merit Scholarship to JK Mullan Highschool.
- Our Orientation Team grew to three members (including a school counselor) to help attend to special needs.
- We created stages that are led by a coordinator (K-2, 3-5, and 6-8) to foster teamwork among our teachers and improve the coordination among grades.
- We updated our reading list for each grade with great narrative texts in accordance with our Narrative Plan.

GROWING IN FRIENDSHIP WITH CHRIST:

- We developed the School of Prayer for Middle School, providing a weekly Mass for Middle School along with a weekly hour of adoration for grades sixth through eighth.
- We celebrated a separate weekly Mass for the entire academic year for Elementary and Middle Shool.
- We had weekly confessions for the school attended by three priests.
- We had a full-time Chaplain for the entire year.
- We created a Pastoral Team to help the Chaplain coordinate and develop the Pastoral Program.
- We had a Disciples Focus Retreat for each grade in Middle School at the beginning of the year.
- We had a Faculty Retreat at the beginning of the academic year.
- We created a "four month challenge" in third grade to prepare our kids for First Communion and Confirmation. Forty-seven of our students were confirmed and received first Communion

GROWING IN VIRTUE:

- We held the Teen Star Program for eighth grade to learn about human sexuality and the Life Star Program for seventh grade to learn about modesty.
- We implemented Theology of the Body in Middle School.
- Our seventh and eighth graders contributed to the common good of the school with two community projects: Living Stations of the Cross, performed by eighth grade, and a Book Festival coordinated by seventh grade.
- Our eighth graders created a pro-life group within the school.





BUILDING THE FUTURE

The Superior General of the Disciples of the Hearts of Jesus and Mary asked Fr. Stefan and Fr. James to create a plan for St. Mary over the next five years. The plan includes three main goals: Academics, Pastoral, and Sustainability, with a total of ten large goals to be achieved by the journey's end. Every one of the Five Pillars of the School is represented and achieved in those goals. These include Friendship with Christ, Educational Covenant, Flourishing, Narrative, and Virtues & Practices.

In five years, the school will be at full capacity, self-sustainable, and will have fully implemented a number of pastoral programs such as Polaris, Focus Retreat, Leadership Program, etc. We will become even more technology-limited, have a stronger Spanish program (complemented by an Exchange Program with our partner schools in Spain), have a narrative approach to pedagogy implemented through our narrative program, and will have the key through theology to understand the world. Friendship with Christ as the cornerstone of our whole educational project will be realized in five years.

2021 - 2022 PROGRESS

GROWING IN KNOWLEDGE:

As of October, enrollment is 474 students. We have:

- Created four new departments in our school: English-Literature, Theology, and Math & History, each of which is led by a teacher. They're all currently setting their own goals.
- Reviewed our math curriculum and implemented the Sadlier Math Program in Kindergarten through fifth grade.
- Expanded our Spanish classes to include K-3.
- Reactivated the Exchange Program with our partner schools in Spain. We will be sending and receiving students this year.

GROWING IN FRIENDSHIP WITH CHRIST:

 We have expanded our school of prayer to elementary school and our kids are now adoring the Lord once a week according to a plan prepared by our teachers and chaplain.

GROWING IN VIRTUE:

- We expanded the DCJM's Focus Retreat in Middle School to an overnight retreat and Theology of the Body to grades 1–5.
- We implemented Polaris in every grade including Preschool with new practices; theater in 5th and a musical in 6th.

Polaris is a program that establishes virtue in each grade as a leitmotif and practice to achieve the virtue. It's linked with the three mandatory readings contemplated in the Narrative Program that matches the virtue of the grade.

2021 - 2022 GOALS

Expand the selection of great narrative texts in our Narrative Project to include books in History, Theology/Catechesis, and a summer reading program.

Review our History and Writing Curriculum this year with the intent to implement new Archdiocese standards.

Work on a new methodology to teach theology in which the narrative of the Bible is the path to learning about God.

Create Rites of Passage for all of our students including Pre-K.

Develop an enrollment plan for this coming year, strategize open houses, school tours, and admission interviews.

Foster a renewed School Culture in collaboration with the faculty based on the School Vision.

Refine financial strategies and practices to help make the school's budget more sustainable.


